First class of 'entrepreneurial' Arts Fundraising Fellows announced

The Arts Council England funded Arts Fundraising and Philanthropy Consortium today announced the first class selected for its *Arts Fundraising Fellowship Programme*. Selected from nearly 200 initial applicants, the first tranche of 11 "Fellows" were chosen by a panel of experts, including Sir Peter Bazalgette, Chair of Arts Council England, following an assessment day at the University of Leeds attended by 64 high-flying Graduates from across the UK.

The 11 Fellows have agreed to participate in an intensive 12-month programme where their passion for the arts will be applied to high-impact projects based with host organisations in London, Leeds, Manchester, Gateshead and Liverpool. This inaugural *Arts Fundraising Fellowship Programme*, the first of its kind in the UK, hopes to create the next generation of leading Development Directors skilled with the vision, entrepreneurial expertise and ingenuity to make significant difference to the arts fundraising landscape.

The first class of 11 Arts Fundraising Fellows were chosen on the basis of individuals' skill sets and their relevance to the chosen host arts organisations with placements announced as follows:

Jill Richens - A New Direction, Stephanie Graham - Barbican, Sarah Ruff - Dance UK, Naomi Allen - Free Word, Sarah Johnston - Opera North, Tom Bevan - Royal Northern College of Music, Emma Pickering - Sadler's Wells, Adam Cooper - Sage Gateshead, Bex





Shindler - Tate Liverpool, Dana Segal - The Roundhouse and Sandie Mattioli - Whitechapel Gallery.

Sir Peter Bazalgette, **Chair, Arts Council England**, said: "The Arts Council recognises that arts and cultural organisations need help to get better at making the case for the arts as a cause worth giving to; and to get better at asking. Part of that includes making sure that the sector has the skills to do this.

I met many of the applicants and they're talented, entrepreneurial Fellows who will make a dynamic contribution to the sector as they progress in their careers. I'm delighted to welcome them to this innovative programme."

Director of Opera North, said: "This first cohort of Fellows will benefit from a pioneering,
practice-based career development programme, supported by leaders in the sector. I am
delighted that this initiative seeks to raise the status of this critical profession."

Michelle Wright Programme Director of the Arts Fundraising and Philanthropy Programme, Cause4 said: 'The Arts Fundraising Fellowship Programme responds to the shortage of skilled arts fundraisers at a time when many organisations have seen significant cuts and need to be flexible and entrepreneurial in the pursuit of alternative income sources. We are aiming to support these 11 Fellows to help redefine the relationships between private and public sector funding leveraging their passion, commitment and know-how to help maximise alternative income streams. We hope, in time, that they become future leaders in this vital field of income generation."

The Arts Fundraising Fellowships were created as a partnership between London-based development and fundraising enterprise *Cause4* and the DARE Fundraising Academy, a





unique collaboration between Opera North and the University of Leeds, together with leading arts and education organisations across London and the north of England.

This will be a rare opportunity to learn on the job from experts in the field, supported by a diverse training and learning programme including a bursary to attend the National Arts Fundraising School, run by the Management Centre. All Fellows will be mentored, trained and gain hands-on experience in the many facets of fundraising and will be expected to make real contribution to their host organisation.

The programme is being evaluated by the University of Leeds and participants will be awarded certification from the University, based on the achievement of objectives agreed at the beginning of the programme.

Earlier this year, ACE announced that the Arts Fundraising and Philanthropy Consortium would be the recipient of a major award through its Transforming Arts Fundraising commissioned grant.





Working in partnership with ACE National Portfolio Organisations (NPOs) and across the wider arts sector, the Arts Fundraising and Philanthropy Consortium will deliver an England-wide programme of training, apprenticeships, coaching and digital skills development to promote innovative and effective practice in arts fundraising.

Arts Fundraising and Philanthropy Consortium partners include arts and education organisations across London in collaboration with development and fundraising enterprise *Cause4*, DARE (Opera North/University of Leeds), the Arts Marketing Association (AMA) and the European Sponsorship Association (ESA). Sector engagement will take place nationally through partnerships with art-form umbrella bodies across music, dance, literature, museums, libraries, theatre and visual arts and galleries, and will include the Association of British Orchestras, Society of London Theatres, Theatrical Management Association, Dance UK, Free Word Centre, Sound and Music and the Visual Arts and Galleries Association.
