New Recruitment Round of South West Arts Fundraising Fellows Announced

The Arts Council England funded Arts Fundraising and Philanthropy Consortium today announced that there would be a further recruitment round for the **Arts Fundraising Fellowship Programme**. The Consortium will now seek to appoint four outstanding graduate Fellows to be based within host arts organisations in the South West of England. This follows the success of the initial recruitment round, in which 11 "Fellows" for the North of England and London were chosen by a panel of experts, including Sir Peter Bazalgette, Chair of Arts Council England.

The *Arts Fundraising Fellowship Programme*, the first of its kind in the UK, hopes to create the next generation of leading Development Directors skilled with the vision, entrepreneurial expertise and ingenuity to make significant difference to the arts fundraising landscape.

The South West Arts Fundraising Fellows hub will be supported by Arts Council England and the University of Exeter, as part of the university's wider development of entrepreneurialism and skills development for arts and cultural organisations.

The four arts organisations selected to be hosts are: Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra, Circomedia, Hall for Cornwall and Ageas Salisbury International Arts Festival. They



represent the breadth of innovative, attractive, high quality art produced and presented across the region, from Cornwall through to Wiltshire.

The recruitment process for the South West cohort will be undertaken over a shorter space of time in order for them to benefit from the wider programme of learning and development that has been put in place for the Fundraising Fellows. However, this cohort will also benefit from training opportunities offered within their region.

The application window is now open, and will close at 5.00pm on Friday 11th October. The four selected South West Fellows will take up their roles in November 2013.

I am absolutely delighted that we have been able to create the strong partnerships necessary for the South West Arts Fundraising Fellows Hub to happen; this amazing region has a huge diversity of arts practice and I am sure that the experience of this first cohort of Fellows will provide valuable lessons and inspiration as we look to build the next generation of leaders in the field'.*

Michelle Wright Programme Director of the Arts Fundraising and Philanthropy Programme, Cause4 said: 'The Arts Fundraising Fellowship Programme responds to the shortage of skilled arts fundraisers at a time when many organisations have seen significant cuts and need to be flexible and entrepreneurial in the pursuit of alternative income sources. We are aiming to support these Fellows to help redefine the relationships between private and public sector funding leveraging their passion, commitment and knowhow to help maximise alternative income streams. We hope, in time, that they become future leaders in this vital field of income generation.'

The Arts Fundraising Fellowships were created as a partnership between London-based development and fundraising enterprise *Cause4* and the DARE Fundraising Academy, a unique collaboration between Opera North and the University of Leeds, together with leading arts and education organisations across London and the north of England.

This will be a rare opportunity to learn on the job from experts in the field, supported by a diverse training and learning programme including a bursary to attend the National Arts Fundraising School, run by the Management Centre. All Fellows will be mentored, trained and gain hands-on experience in the many facets of fundraising and will be expected to make real contribution to their host organisation.

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The programme is being evaluated by the University of Leeds and participants will be awarded certification from the University, based on the achievement of objectives agreed at the beginning of the programme.

About the Arts Fundraising and Philanthropy Consortium

Earlier this year, ACE announced that the Arts Fundraising and Philanthropy Consortium would be the recipient of a major award through its Transforming Arts Fundraising commissioned grant. Working in partnership with ACE National Portfolio Organisations (NPOs) and across the wider arts sector, the Arts Fundraising and Philanthropy Consortium will deliver an England-wide programme of training, apprenticeships, coaching and digital skills development to promote innovative and effective practice in arts fundraising.

Arts Fundraising and Philanthropy Consortium partners include arts and education organisations across London in collaboration with development and fundraising enterprise *Cause4*, DARE (Opera North/University of Leeds), the Arts Marketing Association (AMA) and the European Sponsorship

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Association (ESA). Sector engagement will take place nationally through partnerships with art-form umbrella bodies across music, dance, literature, theatre and visual arts and galleries, and will include the Association of British Orchestras, Society of London Theatres, Theatrical Management Association, Dance UK, Free Word Centre, Sound and Music and the Visual Arts and Galleries Association.
