CAUSE4 LAUNCHES CHARITY TO PROVIDE VITAL SUPPORT FOR EMERGING FUNDRAISERS

~ CAUSE4 urges UK's businesses to get involved to support the sustainability of charities ~

Cause 4 is a social business that supports charities and social enterprises to grow through creating innovative programmes, entrepreneurial business models and ensuring effective fundraising across the charity, arts, sports and education sectors. Today the enterprise launched its own charitable fund, to support the distribution of a percentage of its profits each year to specifically fund talent development programmes.

There are over 180,000 charities in England and Wales that rely on sometimes untrained and often unsupported fundraising staff. The entrepreneurial, business-minded, tenacious fundraiser can be an elusive talent with many charities struggling to recruit talented staff. Without an effective team, charities cannot develop the income generation and vital services to support some of the country's most needy people and communities.

The *Cause4* charitable fund has been set up to support the next generation of fundraisers and charity leaders through providing innovative training, development and mentoring opportunities and to extend the *Cause4* Entrepreneurship programme, a 12 month fast-track talent development programme to support the next generation of business-minded charity leaders and fundraisers. The scheme is having great success with *Cause4* graduates raising over £4m in charitable income for clients in 2013-2014.

The need for highly effective fundraising is paramount across the charitable sector. *Cause4's* CEO, Michelle Wright, wants to encourage other organisations to think about the best use of their corporate social responsibility budgets, as well as to encourage grants from trusts and foundations to support this vital area.

"A one-off donation from any business, group or individual is always appreciated," she said. "However, providing a small charity with the people skills that they need to continue developing the organisation and fundraising successfully longer-term makes a huge difference to the overall sustainability of the cause."

Cause4 chair, Sir Tom Hughes-Hallett says "Organisations that want to support the Cause4 charitable fund will be safe in the knowledge that their donations will help support the next generation of talented charity staff and to build charities into professionally-run, effective, not for profit organisations that can draw in funds and carry out the work to which they are committed. An investment into training up fundraising staff supports the resilience of charities for the future."

The launch of the Fund also coincides with *Cause4* recruiting its first Director of Talent. Emma O'Connell who has a background as a Development Director across the arts, cultural and education sectors will drive forward the *Cause4* Entrepreneurship programme, as well as supporting a wide-range of charities to grow their fundraising talent.

The Cause4 charity will also manage its own staff's charitable giving and payroll giving. The first charitable support is a gift spearheaded by Cause4's CEO Michelle Wright and will be to support children affected by domestic violence.
